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What's the problem?



Policy and skills within memory institutions are no longer aligned to the needs of the collections:

- Staffing ... major changes ahead
- Law and regulation ... major reform is imminent
- Institutional and professional boundaries ... shifting

Advocacy and Leadership is needed but whom to trust?
